# A MESSAGE FROM OUR PATRON



The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme changes lives. The learnings and experiences help young people realise their own capability, what is possible and the leadership role they can play in our community.

By any measure, the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme has had a remarkable year.

STS *Young Endeavour* delivered 12 COVID-safe youth development voyages, embarking 194 young people from ports in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and Tasmania. It surpassed 520,000 nautical miles sailed - the equivalent of more than 24 voyages around the world - since launching in 1987. And in December the Scheme marked the 600<sup>th</sup> youth development voyage delivered in STS *Young Endeavour*.

These achievements are particularly significant insofar as the staff and crew of STS *Young Endeavour* were working against a backdrop of COVID-safe restrictions.

Next year promises to be another exciting period in the life of the Scheme with construction of a new, larger replacement sail training vessel to commence in Australia. This state-of-the-art barquentine will provide even more opportunities for young people.

The new ship will continue the legacy of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme, seen in the positive and permanent effect the youth development program has had on thousands of Australians over the last three decades.

# ABOUT THE YOUNG ENDEAVOUR YOUTH SCHEME

A voyage in STS *Young Endeavour* is much more than simply learning to sail. Participants develop skills in communication, leadership and teamwork, build self-confidence and gain a greater understanding of themselves and each other. Their experiences translate into enduring skills which improve their capacity to participate in education, employment, social life and civic life.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme, in partnership with the Royal Australian Navy, provides young Australians aged 16-23 with a unique, challenging and inspirational experience at sea on board the national sail training ship Young Endeavour.

The brigantine *Young Endeavour* was gifted to the people of Australia by the United Kingdom on the occasion of our Bicentenary in 1988. The Hon Bob Hawke MP, AC, GCL, then Prime Minister of Australia, dedicated *Young Endeavour* to "the benefit of the young people of Australia" and the ship has operated with this guiding principle ever since.

During 34 years of operation, 14,369 young Australians have completed the youth development program and more than 12,000 guests from organisations supporting youth with disability joined a community day sail. *Young Endeavour* has sailed more than 520,000 nautical miles and successfully delivered 605 youth development voyages.

Over that time the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme has evolved and developed into a highly acclaimed youth development program, internationally recognised in the field of sail training.

Voyages in Young Endeavour are an immersive adventure at sea which help participants develop self-awareness, resilience and confidence as they are guided through structured self-development activities. Typically of eleven days duration, most voyages are conducted along the Eastern Australian seaboard, departing from ports in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania.

The experiential learning program conducted on board is delivered by professional Royal Australian Navy personnel who are specially selected and trained for their roles. The emphasis of each voyage is building skills and attributes to develop each participant into a better team player, a more effective communicator and a leader.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme developed and administers the youth development program delivered in *Young Endeavour*. The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme is overseen by an Advisory Board comprised of prominent business leaders and representatives from the Royal Australian Navy and the Department of Defence.

The Royal Australian Navy operates and maintains the ship, ensuring that voyages, while physically and mentally challenging, are conducted with the highest regard to safety. The ship also adheres to a rigorous maintenance schedule to ensure it is fully equipped for ocean sailing.

The majority of participants are selected through a biannual ballot. The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme also partners with community groups and companies that fund scholarships for young people to take part in the program.

#### Aim

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme provides young Australians with a unique, challenging and inspirational experience at sea that increases their self-awareness, develops their teamwork and leadership skills, and creates a strong sense of community responsibility.

#### **Values**

We are committed to upholding the practice of equitable access to the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme's activities.

We conduct all programs with the highest regard for safety.

We support each youth participant to achieve their goals.

In order to maintain activities and prepare the organisation for the future, we operate the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme as a financially responsible business unit.





## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Delivery of a COVID-Safe voyage program during the 2021-22 reporting year delivered overwhelmingly positive outcomes for the young Australians who embarked STS *Young Endeavour*. The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme effectively navigated a challenging year, which nevertheless brought an assurance for the continuation of the Young Endeavour Program into the future.



During the year, the Federal Government announced its intention to build a new, larger vessel to replace STS *Young Endeavour*. Confirmation that Australian shipbuilder Birdon was awarded the contract to build a state-of-the-art sail training ship in Port Macquarie, New South Wales was made public in May. The most significant benefit of this new ship will be a greatly enhanced opportunity for more young Australians to participate in the youth development program.

This welcome decision demonstrates not only the Commonwealth government's ongoing confidence in the program to achieve its youth policy outcomes, but also ensures the longevity of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme's youth development program for the next 25 years.

In July 2021, Young Endeavour welcomed Senator the Hon. David Fawcett and Senator David Van on board for a voyage from Airlie Beach to Cairns as part of the Australian Defence Force Parliamentary Program. Later that year, during Senate Estimates Hearings, Senator Fawcett raised the Young Endeavour Program with the Chief of Navy, Vice Admiral Michael Noonan, AO, RAN. In reference to the ADF Parliamentary Program, he said:

"I took the opportunity to participate and spent about ten days with the crew of the Sail Training Ship *Young Endeavour*. I want to pass on my thanks to you for facilitating the program, but more to the point, to congratulate the crew, in particular, for the work they are doing with Australia's youth.

The crew demonstrated, I think, the best of Navy, in terms of their professionalism and their ability to portray Defence as an organisation and to develop the capabilities and confidence of these young people.

It is a job very well done. Although I thanked the crew personally, I'd like to pass this on publically, and through you, my thanks for the work that they do".

The past twelve months brought new challenges to the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme. Many of these have been associated with managing the impact of COVID-19, both in the planning of, and in the delivery of voyages. While the need to impose measures such as a strict testing regime, a suspension of community day sails and open ships, and



not allowing family and friends on board in port, was regrettable, these measures were nevertheless effective in minimising the impact of the pandemic on the voyage program.

COVID-Safe voyaging measures allowed the majority of voyages to be undertaken without incident. On the two occasions COVID-19 was detected amongst the youth crew, the voyages were terminated immediately and all youth crew offered a future opportunity. On these occasions the response of both the Scheme's staff and ship's crew was exemplary, providing timely and effective administrative and ground support to facilitate youth crew travel home. In line with community and Defence guidelines, voyage scheduling is now back to a pre-pandemic level of activity.

Operating in a dynamic environment, the Scheme continues to evolve and redefine the methods it uses to promote *Young Endeavour*, select youth crew and deliver the youth development program. In doing so it aims to increase opportunities for and encourage young Australians to participate in this challenging and rewarding program - a program which, over time, contributes to building a better community.

Young Endeavour youth ambassadors are now better supported in promoting the Scheme in their local communities. Our online Ambassador Hub ensures these individuals - who have each experienced a voyage in Young Endeavour - have access to current information on voyages and upcoming events, and are supported with material to share with their local communities.

Ongoing support from the Royal Australian Navy ensures that *Young Endeavour* is maintained at the highest standards. The values and culture that Navy brings to the program remain important to the ongoing success of the Scheme.

We are also reconnecting with our enduring community and corporate partners, and establishing new partnerships to improve applicant diversity and broaden access to the program through Young Endeavour Scholarships.

As the Scheme looks to a future that will include a new, larger, purpose built sail training ship, the enthusiasm of the Young Endeavour Advisory Board remains undiminished. Across the Advisory Board, the Scheme, the Ship and the Navy capability team, we are committed to ensuring the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme delivers a safe, relevant and effective youth development program that continues to inspire, motivate and benefit the youth of Australia.

## SHIP OPERATIONS REPORT

The 2021-22 reporting period was extremely successful in the delivery of youth development voyages in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and South Australia. The ship sailed from Cairns in the north as far as Hobart in the south and Adelaide to the west, covering some 7,600 nm. Highlights of the year included support to the Rolex Sydney to Hobart yacht race and Geelong Wooden Boat Festival, as well as a successful docking for scheduled maintenance.



#### **Program**

I assumed Command from Lieutenant Commander Andrew Callander in July 2021, joining the ship in Cairns to deliver a program of voyages south along the Queensland coast. Participation in these ten day youth development voyages was limited to 18 Queensland youth crew to comply with travel restrictions and COVID-Safe voyaging measures. In total, STS Young Endeavour was deployed to Queensland for four months, fully compliant with state quarantine requirements.

The ship then returned to New South Wales and entered an Extended Maintenance Period,

before delivering the final youth development voyage for 2021. On completion, the staff crew turned their focus to preparing for the Rolex Sydney Hobart Yacht Race and staging the ship in southern Australian for the start of the 2022 voyage program. The 2021 Sydney Hobart Yacht Race would turn out to have one of the lowest completion rates in recent history, with many yachts retiring due to damage in very rough conditions. *Young Endeavour* made it to Hobart unscathed on New Year's Eve with a crew of Navy staff, alumni and guests embarked for the once in a lifetime experience.

Mitigation for the pandemic continued during the ship's southern voyage program, which included visits to Geelong and Adelaide.

During our second visit to Geelong staff crew participated in numerous activities in support of the Geelong Wooden Boat Festival, including presenting talks to attendees and opening the ship to visitors for the first time since early 2020.

#### Maintenance

The Extended Maintenance Period at Waterhen in October 2021 afforded members of the staff crew some much needed respite at home - due to interstate travel restrictions many had not returned to Sydney since March. A standard package of planned and corrective maintenance took place during this time.

Additional maintenance work was conducted in December 2021 following a martingale or dolphin-striker collapse in Jervis Bay. The ship returned safely to Sydney and was re-rigged before the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race.

Young Endeavour commenced the second maintenance period of the year in April 2022, entering the Captain Cook Graving Dock for a scheduled docking. As we conclude the year, the teams from Noakes, Thales, Navy Fleet Support Unit and the ship's staff crew are working collaboratively to complete scheduled work as well as additional growth work in the galley. We are confident in achieving and meeting all aims and requirements and look forward to commencing our next voyage in August.

#### Personnel

The Navy posting cycle plays a large part in the operation of the ship and, as in 2020-21, travel restrictions associated with the pandemic continued to impact suitability voyages and assessments for new staff members. During the year, the majority of staff crew changed out and several gaps were managed with support from relief and reserve crew members, who helped keep the ship sailing and allowed permanent staff the opportunity to take leave and manage fatigue.

During the year staff crew participated in a dedicated staff training voyage, which was highly successful and will be included in future programs as a scheduled activity. Unusually long periods alongside in interstate ports, away from families, presented a challenge however morale remains high and the crew are looking forward to resuming the voyage program post maintenance.

Following two previous postings to the ship as Navigator and Executive Officer, it is a great honour and privilege to be back serving the youth of Australia, this time in Command. There is no greater thrill nor challenge.

# THE YOUNG ENDEAVOUR YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Research shows that the Young Endeavour Youth Development Program has a long-lasting, positive impact on participants, building social capital in the community by increasing trust, cooperation and tolerance. Over time the experience translates into enduring social skills and a more positive outlook on life, bringing broader benefits to both individual participants and the Australian community.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme delivers a world recognised sail training program to young Australians in STS *Young Endeavour*.

During each eleven day voyage, youth crew aged between 16 to 23 years work in small teams, and sail the ship twenty-four hours a day in all types of conditions. They live 'between decks' in a close community with youth from a diverse range of backgrounds, and are encouraged to identify and pursue personal and team goals and challenges.

The tall ship environment provides a unique and powerful opportunity in which to conduct outdoor education. As they progress through the structured program from instructor-led activities to self-directed management of a 44m vessel, participants are encouraged to rapidly develop interpersonal, leadership and teamwork skills, which are transferable to everyday life and career settings.

Youth crew discover new reserves of character, commitment and confidence as they move outside their comfort zones and are given the tools and opportunity to overcome real world challenges. The program is also designed to elicit an appreciation of the individual strengths diversity brings to the voyage, and to instil a desire in participants to give back to the community.

The program is structured in three distinct phases - the Crisis Phase, Transition Phase and the Arrival Phase.

#### **Crisis Phase**

These first few days are a rapid induction into routines, safety procedures and life on board a tall ship. Youth crew are confronted

by challenges including climbing the mast, seasickness, a lack of sleep, living and working with new and unfamiliar people, and learning new skills. The staff crew support and encourage youth crew through this phase, helping them to develop the skills to operate safely on board and to overcome the challenges of life at sea.

#### **Transition Phase**

This is a time of consolidation as the youth crew transition from instructional leadership to guided leadership. The youth crew continue to develop sailing skills while shifting focus to the personal and interpersonal aspects which contribute to the success of each activity. Each group of youth crew is given increasing responsibility for itself, allowing individuals greater opportunities for participation and teamwork.

#### The Arrival Phase

This program culminates with the opportunity for youth crew to take responsibility for the ship for a twenty-four hour period and put into practice everything they have learned about sailing, about themselves and about working together as a team. From the commencement of Command Day participants are effectively autonomous as the staff crew step back, continuing to monitor safety, while the youth crew take on the real challenge of sailing a 44m square-rigged tall ship on the open sea.

On the penultimate day of most voyages youth crew then host a group of young people with disability for a community day sail, consolidating their experience by sharing the knowledge they have gained on board.



## SAILING IN YOUNG ENDEAVOUR

A voyage in *Young Endeavour* is an opportunity for a young person to discover what they are capable of. The exhilarating adventure at sea is designed to challenge participants to discover new limits of endurance and personal strength as they learn to sail a square-rigged tall ship along the Australian coast.



Most of the young Australians who join a voyage in *Young Endeavour* have never sailed before, and very few have sailed a tall ship on the open ocean.

As members of a 24 strong youth crew, each participant is challenged to sail a square-rigged tall ship, including learning how to navigate, keep watch, cook in the galley, set and furl sails, climb the 30 metre masts, and take the helm.

In learning how to sail the ship youth crew are learning how to work together as a team, and to recognise and appreciate the strengths of a diverse group of individuals. They are supported by our specially trained Royal Australian Navy staff crew and encouraged to step out of their comfort zones, building the confidence to actively contribute and take on leadership roles amongst their peers.

During each voyage, the youth crew is split into three watches, each supported by a dedicated Watch Leader who will teach them the skills to sail a tall ship while guiding them through the youth development program. Regular debriefs are held to consolidate lessons learned, and targeted questions,

reviews, guided discussion and personal reflection prompt youth crew to understand how their experiences can be translated into everyday life.

Towards the end of each voyage, the youth crew collectively elect a captain and command team and are given the real world responsibility of safely sailing *Young Endeavour* to their final destination.

Applications to sail *Young Endeavour* are open to Australian citizens or permanent residents aged 16-23 years, who meet minimum health and fitness requirements. Most young people apply for a voyage via the biannual public ballot.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme is committed to providing equitable access to Young Endeavour for a diverse range of young people. Financially assisted berths are made available to applicants who meet specific criteria.

Our corporate and community partners also offer voyage scholarships directly to young people in the community.

In the last financial year, 194 youth crew joined *Young Endeavour* on 12 voyages, with reduced numbers embarked as part of a comprehensive suite of measures put in place to reduce the risk of community transmission of the novel coronavirus.


Six youth crew participated through scholarships funded by our corporate and community partners and nineteen received financial assistance.

# COMMUNITY DAY SAILS

An important part of the Young Endeavour youth development program is our community day sails. On the penultimate day of the program, an organisation supporting youth with disability is invited to join *Young Endeavour*.

This provides an opportunity for members of the community who cannot take part in a voyage to experience time under sail. It also gives the youth crew a chance to share their experiences with others. This develops participants' appreciation of diversity and instils a desire to contribute when they return to their own communities.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme maintains a register of interest for organisations that are interested in bringing their clients aboard *Young Endeavour* for a community day sail.

# YOUNG ENDEAVOUR YOUTH SCHEME GOVERNANCE

In 1988, the Minister for Defence established the Young Endeavour Advisory Board to provide advice and support to the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme regarding the development program conducted for young Australians in STS Young Endeavour.

Advisory Board members are appointed by the Minister for terms of three years. The Fleet Commander Australia, the Executive Director of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme and a Department of Defence senior executive are ex-officio members.

The Advisory Board is responsible through the Chairman to the Minister for Defence and shall:

- a. ensure that STS Young Endeavour is operated for the benefit of young Australians;
- b. provide a broad and balanced input of community views on the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme to ensure that appropriate outcomes are planned and performance is monitored and achieved;
- c. provide advice to the Minister for Defence on the means of achieving the aim of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme;
- d. review the development of initiatives that advance the aim of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme for all young Australians, and generate community awareness and funding support for implementing those initiatives;
- e. be accountable for the disbursement of funds held in the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme Public Fund Trust and associated investment accounts, and ensure the

Executive Director implements policies that are consistent with the aim of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme;

- f. review expenditure and revenue estimates and achievement;
- g. review and recommend voyage fees to be levied on youth participants, and pricing policies for other revenue items;
- h. review strategies to publicise and market the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme;
- provide advice to the Navy, through the Executive Director, on youth development objectives and on matters related to the ship's activities; and
- j. report annually to the Minister for Defence on the operation of the Young Endeavour Youth Scheme.
